Over a 12-week period, youth ages 13-24, will receive; weekly training sessions utilizing our SYC mental wellness curriculum developed specifically for local youth in alignment with Sacramento Youth Development Plan with input from our mental health consultant, and 10 hours of youth led, advocacy, community outreach and/or awareness campaigns featuring youth voice and culture. This funding will support two youth cohorts, per year.

The project develops and employs peer leaders, offers daily drop-in, arts-centered wellness groups, and develops job skills as youth plan and lead educational campaigns and events addressing depression and youth wellness.

SUITE 1080 will establish a Peer Advocate Team of Asian/Southeast Asian youth. Peer Advocates will lead; up to four mental health education social media campaigns each year targeting Sacramento Asian/Southeast Asian youth; an annual Youth Summit touching 300 youth each year and support the Drop-In Center - a welcoming one-stop integrated care space where young people access a wide variety of supports that address their social, emotional, and mental wellness needs.

MH peer support will target immigrant and refugee youth to provide culturally and linguistically relevant support to youth of Middle East and North African (MENA) descent. Youth ages 14-24 will be trained as peer support specialists to increase MENA youth's interest in careers in MH and provide a paid opportunity to enhance their skills and serve their community. The prevention and early intervention focus is to improve coping skills, stress management techniques, and reduce stigma toward seeking MH.

In this project, every Academy student will be impacted. Academy students will receive workforce development workshops, industry/career speakers, and college visits. Paid internships are coordinated by CBO Center for Land-Based Learning (CLBL). A cohort of students will participate in CLBL's FARMS Leadership Program, and BUG Alumni will work as Internship Assistants. Finally, regional post-secondary students in agriculture and environmental sciences will provide peer-to-peer mentorship and support. The Project's overarching goal is to empower youth to discover and engage in local food systems that encourage healthy living, nurture the environment, and grow sustainable communities.</p>

Oak Park</p>	<p>NSBIF will provide youth ages 16-18 with work readiness training, paid work experience and support services to equip them with 21st century job skills, prepare them for employment or post-secondary training that leads to successful careers. Using a hybrid model, 40 hours of training will be offered to each youth. Students will be placed in the high demand building industry and related sectors for paid work experience. A projected 85% of participants will obtain full-time employment and/or enroll in post-secondary training after completing the program.</p>

Weekly one-on-one case-management at locations safe and convenient for participants (i.e., library, community centers) to address participants' barriers to employment and foster health and stability as they enter the workforce. This includes providing resources to meet basic needs. Workforce services include financial literacy, career goal setting, promotion of job readiness, connection to job training, academic resources, job and internship placement and retention services.</p>

Upon completion, participants will have working and foundational knowledge to safely work in a construction environment; receive a pre-apprenticeship certificate of completion and will have earned pre-requisites necessary for future apprenticeship education and training programs at PHCC, construction charter school or any other construction trade apprenticeship program. Coursework will include history of the trades, construction math, tool identification, CPR/first aid, and safety training. Additional topics include alternatives to violence curriculum, soft skills including business communication, and interview skills.</p>

The goal is to drive cross-sector communication and coordination in the youth workforce development ecosystem to improve youth worker- and employer-level outcomes. We seek to align youth skill development with employer needs, connect youth with a continuum of workforce development opportunities, and address systemic inequality faced by under-served youth. PRO, SETA, and SRA will partner to bring together a cross sector of youth workforce development stakeholders to create an action-oriented community of practice, ensuring representation from five key groups: 1) Youth; 2) Community-based organizations; 3) Education; 4) Employers; and 5) Government/Public sector.</p>

WSWC is a school turnaround program to significantly increase the number of students who graduate from high school prepared for college and the workforce. WSWC helps transform schools and student experience by focusing on attendance, social-emotional support, and academic tutoring. To deliver WSWC, City Year Sacramento places teams of 8-15 young adult AmeriCorps members (ACMs), ages 18-25, into partner schools where they serve every day as Student Success Coaches, providing high-quality support to students, teachers, and the wider school community. Supports include but are not limited to, whole classroom support, small group tutoring, enrichment clubs, and whole school activities.</p>

Program activities are offered in a protective community environment at the Mack Road Valley Hi Community Center. Homework help and other activities include a rotating schedule of 3-4 daily activities. Supportive services are offered on an open-door/on-demand/as-needed basis.</p>

The partnership is intended to meet the goals of each organization's existing and ongoing programs while providing opportunities for safe outdoor recreation, team building, and leadership training to a group of youth who have historically</p>

				had the least access to such opportunities. Camps will be led by mentors and educators trained jointly by the three organizations. The overarching goals of the project are: 1) Strengthen youth development programming in Sacramento, 2) Foster academic success by providing impactful STEM and outdoor learning opportunities to low-income students, and 3) Promote youth empowerment by providing social justice and leadership training to youth from Sacramento's high priority neighborhoods.

Five separate 12-week workshops will be taught in 2-hour weekly sessions accompanied by ongoing adult and peer-to-peer mentor support.
G.A.P. Power in Change targets youth ages 14-24 who have been exposed to violence; incarcerated; involved in the justice system; low income; teen parents; English language learners; mental and behavioral health challenges. Mental Wellness is our priority. Program strategies aim to address social emotional impact of distance learning, reduce shame, provide tools to combat depression and suicide for self and peers. Work-readiness training including financial literacy is provided. and address lack of access to resources. The program incorporate mental health professionals as instructors and utilizes near-peer young adults for outreach and engagement by coaching/training younger students while earning a stipend.
